Keynote Speaker Munir Shivji

A Montessori educator, administrator, leader, and alum; and the child of a Montessori school founder, Munir Shivji has lived "the Montessori life" from his earliest days, both in the classroom and at home.

He is founding head of 2 Montessori schools in Texas and founder of The Institute of Montessori Education, an organization that advocates for and fosters advancement of Montessori.

He is also founding director of the Cambridge Montessori Institute, an AMS-affiliated teacher training program in Massachusetts; a former program director at Cambridge Montessori School; and a former Montessori Early Childhood teacher.

When Munir joined the American Montessori Society as staff in 2020, he already knew the organization intimately, having served on the AMS Board of Directors for 7 years. Two of these years were as board president, during which he guided the organization through several major organizational changes, as well as the coronavirus pandemic. He holds AMS credentials at the Early Childhood and Administrator levels and a master's degree in Montessori education from St. Catherine University.

1-A <u>Making Sense of Elementary Science</u> Level: EL / AD Presented by <u>Dr. Daniel Robinson (Robin) Howe</u>

Science at the Elementary level is confusing! Dr. Montessori and her contemporaries never created a "Physical Science" curriculum, but focused on biology and geography, often incorporating other areas of science as part of an integrated curriculum. This workshop explores the historical approach to "science" at the elementary level and then discusses the incorporation of biology, chemistry, geology, and physical science in a manageable and holistic way that prepares students for future studies in the sciences.

1-B <u>Connecting our World Through Science</u> Level: EC Presented by <u>Helen DeVere</u>

Explore facts and activities that involve children and families in learning about our world. See ways to encourage curiosity and understanding of the interconnectedness of all living things, in order to help them become responsible stewards of our planet and all living things. What is Grace and Courtesy? Does it matter? Can it Move Montessori Forward? Exploring a minimum of ten reasons to move forward with, and in Montessori starting by recognizing the exceptional inspirational stubborn Maria Montessori and her approach to education, the awareness of modern parents, the foundations for children to will, to think and to act by themselves as well as the current recognition of the scientific community.

3-F The Logical Path of Montessori Math Level: EC / EL / AD Presented by Michael Dorer and Shanna Honan

Have you ever wondered how properly setting up math shelves can help you understand scope and sequence? Join Michael and Shanna for a dynamic session decoding the various "strands" of Montessori arithmetic. Learn the secrets of the decimal system, the "Five Laws," the passage to abstraction, proficiency with basic facts, and the aims of materials that teach the four operations? Come let Michael and Shanna share the answers to these questions and many more.

3-G <u>Writing Work that Promotes Literacy & Self regulation</u> Level EC Presented by <u>Susan Scheibenzuber</u>

Guide students ready to write with daily work and have them keep it in a journal. Once formation skills are mastered offer work that promotes story writing, dictation, grammar and self expression. Techniques will be shared to guide kindergarten students in small meetings to build these skills. We will use Beautiful Handwriting Materials to demonstrate techniques. Journals allow students to self regulation their work. This historical record allows the teacher to guide students as well.

4-A Early Childhood Round Table Level EC Presented by Karen Tolliver

Gather with other Early Childhood directors as discussions center around helping our students navigate the ever changing learning environment the pandemic has forced upon us. Support along with successful tips and experiences will be shared as we help each other to continue on our Montessori path as we move forward in our endeavors.

4-B Can PBIS work in the Montessori School Level: EL / AD / Admin Presented by Stephanie Babcock-Wright & Katherine Morrison-Davis

Montessori and PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention and Support) go hand in hand conceptually, but what about in practice? Does the official PBIS framework allow our Montessori schools to remain true to their missions and operate with fidelity to the Montessori model? We share our 2+ year experience becoming the only Montessori charter school in Georgia with a flourishing PBIS program.

4-C Montessori Between the Is and the Is Not Level: EC / ALL Presented by Marie Therese Bishay

In our work as Montessorians, we gather a lot of ideas along the way. Some are good and some are not. It also depends on one's own personal tendencies, which can make an idea seem logical and easier to accept. In this workshop, there will be shared observations on some ideas and techniques when following the Montessori scene which will help you understand and learn for your own classroom.

4-D How to Holistically Plan a Montessori Project Level: EC /ALL Presented by Sandra Pokos & Maja Bizelj

The Montessori school offers an ideal opportunity to take a holistic view of the development of children and adults. Essentially – looking at the whole of an individual, focusing on how they develop in every aspect. So before planning begins, one has to look at the whole child/adult and have a basic understanding of the different aspect which creates the whole. Only then can we connect it to every area in the classroom

4-E Modern Mindfulness and Montessori Level : ALL Presented by Yanik Tremblay

In moving Montessori forward, we will explore the latest research on mindfulness with its applications and benefits. Furthermore, we will look at how ancient techniques from the East can be applied to foster mindfulness in the child. 4-G Partnering with Parents during a Pandemic Level IT /ALL Presented by Christina Muehlbauer

<u>1-A - Robin Howe</u> began his Montessori career at the age of two at the Barrie School in Silver Spring, MD, which he attended through the eighth grade. Graduating from Dickinson College with two majors (Spanish and Religion), he went on to earn a Master's Degree in Bioethics from University of South Florida . He earned his Primary certification from Palm Harbor Montessori School (AMS) then attended St. Catherine's University to earn his Lower and Upper Elementary Certification (AMS). He also attended NAMTA's Orientation to Adolescent Studies (AMI). He holds a Doctorate in Educational Leadership from Argosy University and is a Senior Montessori Foundation School Consultant.

<u>1-B - Helen DeVere</u> has been director of the Orlando Montessori Teacher Education Institute for early childhood studies in Florida, since 1990. She has a degree in elementary education from the University of Connecticut and a Master's degree in early childhood/elementary education from Antioch New England Graduate School. Helen completed her AMS early childhood training in Boston with Ann Neubert in 1982, and her AMS lower elementary training with Seacoast Center for Education, NH, in 2006. She has been a classroom teacher at both levels. Helen is founder (1985) and former director of Heritage Montessori School in Ridgecrest, CA, and cofounder (1998) and former director/classroom teacher at the Montessori School of Celebration (FL). She was also on the Board of Directors of the Montessori Accreditation Council for Teacher Education MACTE) for 3 terms. Since retiring from her school, she is spending her time directing and teaching in OMTEI, teaching for other teacher education programs in the US and in China, Hong Kong and Taiwan ,and giving workshops and seminars.

<u>1-C - Meghan Redman</u> earned her bachelor's degree in Family and Consumer Studies from East Tennessee State University, where she fell in love with early childhood education. She also holds her international Montessori, primary certification from the Pan-American Montessori Society. Meghan started her teaching career 14 years ago at her university's childcare facility, where she was first introduced to non-traditional education, in a Waldorf and Reggio environment. After moving to Atlanta in 2013, she had the opportunity to begin teaching in a Montessori environment and has been in love with the method ever since.

<u>1-D - Rose Dorer</u> did Graduate Study in Administrative Licensure: Education at Saint Mary's University of Minnesota, Winona, MN, completed in January 2001.
